ere we are at the beginning of October and the start of our English photo season. Strange to think that one should get so excited about a new series of club meetings, but all the members do. As I insinuated previously, the return is just as exciting as the first day of school after summer vacation. The anticipation here was stimulated by the fact that the very first meeting kicked off in top gear. For several weeks members had been preparing their entries for their "first of the competition series" and sending them to the club competition secretary. So, at the first meeting, with the arrival of a judge along with all the previously submitted entries, we were excitingly anticipating the judging and assessment process.

The first night's submissions were for a "Panel Competition". This allowed members to group together as teams for the "panel" competition. Up to five members may combine their entries for judging. The first panel event was a group of five prints covering a cohesive subject and was judged as "groups of five". In my group of five, my colleagues had put two of my prints in the five print panel. Maybe that is why we did not place in the top awards. However, I was rather surprised to see that the



judge did pick one of my two prints as the best in the Panel. The winner of this panel competition won the Jessops Cup (silver) and will hold it for a year.

Next week the subject being submitted is "Airborne". Entries need not be in any particular media as all entries are judged for their photographic standards not whether they are monochrome or color or special techniques. Each member may enter up to four entries. However, if there should be an entry overload then one of the four pictures in all the groups of four will be discarded.



During the past summer months, many of the club members here have kept in touch with each other and have enjoyed social and photo time together on several excursions and casual photo reviews. This casual association is a good way to get to know other members s who share your interests in photography or other fields.

At the first evening back all the members pay their dues for the season. This really simplifies the bookkeeping. Late

returners will do the same on their first meeting of the season and, of course, new members will do so after a three week probationary period when, during that time, they will pay a nominal

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
This week's club meeting encompassed an in-depth instructional session on how to achieve accreditation with the PAGB, The Photographic Alliance of Great Britain which is a national photo association. The PAGB publishes, each year, a 150 page directory /handbook which encompasses every thing you need to know to help make the individual clubs run a smooth and efficient operation. It lists speakers, judges, rules and regulations and suggested stipends to pay for the services the club receives in that area, together with lots of contact and competition information.

Accreditation is a most important part of the photographic scene in Europe. It is a means of testing and comparing one's ability against a recognized set of standards. Furthermore, it is most satisfying that each of us may be acknowledged by our peers and be able to demonstrate to them that we have achieved a level of skills in one of the three levels of photographic art. The highest level has received less than one hundred graduates during the 10 or so years since it was incorporated into the grade levels. This demonstrates the very high standard that is required to reach the highest point of our hobby. Indeed, none of the levels of skill is easy to achieve.

This week our presenter brought with her a series of panels that had previously been submitted for accreditation. Not all had been successful in their attempts at accreditation. After a slide and narrative presentation on what the judges look for during the judging process, the club members were asked to form teams of three. After each team had reviewed the panels of photographs, we were asked to make our own judgements as to the score that each team thought applicable to each photograph in each panel. We were encouraged to use the criteria suggested by our presenter. It was very interesting as to where we found our judging skills to be compared with the "pros"! The team scores were an average of the three members. It was surprising how accurate we were!

We recently returned to the typical British wintery weather with torrential rain and high winds. Taking photographs is rather a task now. Lighting is not good and the rain or sea spray soon takes its toll on the lens. Trying to capture local wind surfers skimming along at 45 mph is a challenge while the offshore yachts are too distant and shrouded in misty rain for good results. However, after some lengthy computer adjustments and post development work, a few shots of merit emerged. This is where taking Raw images is of a great help. Winter vistas can miraculously change to sunny panoramas. The wonders of Photo Shop or similar programs!

The leaves are about to change color and if the wind stays away then perhaps some fall photography will be on the cards. Last year the trees were stripped in a couple of days because of high winds and rain. Soggy

This is always an interesting event. This open interaction leads to harmony, understanding and cohesion with the group of clubs in this 6 county area.

After lunch there will be a presentation by a very much appreciated Irish Photographer, Des Clinton FRPS,FIPF, MFIAP. The tile of the program is "The Professional Photographer" and for sure it will be an interesting and striking two hours of amusing commentary and brilliant slide show. His work is held in high esteem around the world. Flying Des in from Ireland will not be a wasted effort and it is anticipated that attendance will very high.

My local club directory tells me that next Monday's meeting will include a presentation by the ISCA group. This is a team of photographers who initially came together purely as a photo print appreciation group. Each will show some panels of their work exhibiting their individual prowess and members will be able to examine and discuss the varying attributes presented. As usual this should be an intriguing and social evening with tea and cookies and lots of chatter at the break.

Looking forward to getting back into the sunshine. Keep that camera at hand all the time.

#### NATURE Taking a fresh-looking and vibrant shot with a splash of color

#### Choose The Right Lens

A dedicated macro lens is ideal, as these are short telephoto lenses that can focus all the way down to life-size. Many 70-300 mm zoom lenses offer a macro feature and these can often magnify to half life-size making them suitable for floral close ups.



#### Arrange the Flower

When you find the bloom that is a suitable candidate and as near perfect as it might be, determine the best angle so you have a good view of the stamen and a tidy background behind it. Next use a fine water spray and give the flower a couple of squirts. Be careful and do not get too generous as all you are trying to do is simulate early morning dew. When you have a good glisten and the light is right you are ready to take the shot.

#### Set Up Your Camera

Use a tripod. Frame up and manually focus on the stamen of the flower. Use aperture priority mode (A or AV) and dial in a medium aperture of either F8 or F11 and make sure your metering is on its multi segment setting. If you think more light is needed to get that extra sparkle on the water drops then use a square of foil, crunched up and then flattened as a reflector.

#### Make the Shot

Should there be a slight breeze and the flower is moving then give the stem some support. Use a thin bamboo stick and twist ties. Always check your focus on your screen by zooming right in.





#### **ENTER YOUR BEST PICTURES**

The Indian River Photo Club (<a href="www.indianriverphotoclub.org">www.indianriverphotoclub.org</a>) announces its 2013 Photographic Print Exhibit, to be displayed in the Studio Gallery at the Vero Beach Museum of Art, from December 7th to January 5, 2014. Entry is open to anyone residing in Indian River, Brevard or St. Lucie County, amateur or professional, and to any member of the Indian River Photo Club, regardless of residence address. Because of space limitations in the Studio Gallery, this will be a juried exhibit. Rules for the exhibit follow:

**EXHIBIT DATES** December 7 through January 5, 2014

**INTAKE DATE** December 4 – Wednesday, 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM, at the

Vero Beach Museum of Art

ELIGIBILITY All members of the Indian River Photo Club and any

non-member residing in Indian River, Brevard or St. Lucie

County, professional or amateur

#### **PRINT CATEGORIES**

**PEOPLE** - Posed or candid, portraits or groups

**NATURE** - **Flora**- Flowers, plants, etc.

Fauna- Animals, birds, etc.

As noted above, Nature is split into two categories. Evidence of human influence will be allowed, but the subject should be

primarily natural.

**STILL LIFE** - Arrangements, natural or man-made, of inanimate objects

**SCAPES** - Landscapes, seascapes, cityscapes

SPECIAL TECHNIQUE - Out of the ordinary techniques, digitally altered

images of any subject.\*

**OPEN** - Abstracts and images that don't fit the other categories.

\* The Special Technique category applies to both film and digital images. It shall include any image that has been substantially altered from its original form using digital image editing techniques. Substantial alteration includes such actions as: printing with multiple layers, adding, removing or rearranging elements of the picture, use of digital filters that alter the texture of the image, color substitution, etc.. Images that incorporate double exposure, time lapse, hand tinting, etc., should be entered in this category.

Special Techniques *does not include* normal imaging processing by digital means, such as cropping, dodging, burning, or contrast or density control. Photographs that are captured with a digital camera or film images that have been printed using a computer and printer are not considered differently than film images that may have been processed in conventional darkroom techniques, unless they have been substantially altered as described above.

#### **ENTRIES**

- Prints must have been made in 2012 to 2013.
- The Photographer's name should not be displayed on the front of their picture.
- Pictures must be the work of the entering photographer, except that a photographer may enter prints made, mounted or framed by another person, from the entering photographer's image.
- Traditional prints must be framed, under glass and <u>wired for hanging</u>. No sawtooth hangers will be accepted. The only exception to this is if a photo is printed on canvas, it is not required to be under glass. When printed on canvas, a "gallery wrap" format is acceptable. Gallery wraps must still be wired for hanging.
- Minimum photo size 8" x 10"
- Maximum picture size 30"x 30" frame dimensions
- The original image of a Special Technique or digitally altered submission must be affixed to the back of the submitted photograph.
- Pictures must be marked on the back as follows:

Photographer's name and phone number Title Entry category

Pictures selected for the Exhibit may not be removed before January 6th, and must be picked up between 10:00 AM and 3:00 PM on Monday, January 6th. If your entry(s) were not accepted, you will be contacted Dec. 4th after 4:00 p.m. or Dec. 5th.

#### **ENTRY FEES**

\$10.00 per print. Indian River Photo Club members get one free entry. Limit of three (3) total entries by an individual. No refund for entries, whether juried in or out. Entry forms will be available at intake on December 4th.

<u>JUDGING</u> - Entries to be displayed will be selected by a three-person jury. Judging for awards by the same jury.

<u>AWARDS</u> - Ribbons will be awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in each category. Prize winning photographs will be published in Vero Beach Magazine. Press release to local newspapers.
