



Combining two photographs into one..... Making a silk purse out of a sows ear, sometimes !!!!!!!

How To Blend two images together

ften after a photoshoot and while examining the recently taken photographs, one realizes that "if only you had done that or taken that" then the picture might have been perfect or at least what you would like. Perhaps you can see that you have all the elements you need, but they are in two different shots. No, all is not lost! You do not have to travel back to Arizona to retake the shots which would never be the same any way!



You can combine the best parts of two (or more) photos to create a perfect (?) picture and by using your photo processing program on your computer it is generally a simple but effective process.

Here we run though one way on how you can achieve great results. We shall use some wedding shots to just give you an idea of what can be achieved. It does take a little time and will take some patience and practice, but you will feel very accomplished when it is completed!



Open the two images you wish to combine in your photo management program (we use PhotoPlus X4 in this example) and place them on the same canvas. If any image is on the Background Layer, right-click on the Layer and click "Promote to Layer". Resize, move and crop the images until they are the right size and in the right place. At first this takes a little bit of manipulating! After a couple of times it will become second nature!

You then need to create a Mask on the top Layer. With the Mask selected, click the Gradient tool in the toolbar. Click on the Gradient tool and select the Black to White Gradient. Then drag on your image where you want the blend to start and finish.

You may want to merge the colors of both images. To do this, merge the two Layers into one by selecting both Layers, then right-click and select Merge Selected Layers. Then Desaturate the newly-merged

Layer using the Black & White option.

With the Layer still selected, click on the New Adjustment Layer icon on the Layers palette and select Color Balance. You can then play with Color and Blend Mode options to achieve the desired effect giving you a perfect, blended image.

<u>Please note</u> that not all photo programs are identical in

the way they need to be used, and depending on the program you have it is certain there are variations, but, the results should be the same. As indicated above, we use PhotoPlus X4 by Serif, and get excellent results all the time



and this demonstration was based on using that program. Having a problem then send us an e-mail!

This next January's photo award subject is "Forgotten Things".

nce again our monthly awards subject has a word in it that we often use quite a lot in our daily vocabulary. As we all get older, perhaps, we use it more and more. Let's take note of its derivative. Five of its letters tell the tail of its true meaning.....FORGE! That means to move ahead or to move steadily on,

which is what we do every day since the day of our birth. Moving further from, or more distant from, that first day. No wonder it is hard to remember and we forget!

True to form, we then tend to gradually forget what we should not forget. Thinking back you probably remember your mother reminding you that "your head would fall off if you did not remember to do what she had asked of you". But then you were so young and it did not seem to matter!
